Victoria Montessori School, Entebbe, **Uganda**, is currently the only A.M.S. school in Uganda, East Africa. Founded in 2001 by Christine Kijange and her husband Joseph, the school serves children from 2 to 12 years of age, including refuge/orphans from the Gulu District of Northern Uganda. Christine was chosen in 2006 to receive the AMS Ursula Thrush Peace Seed Grant to start "Peace Clubs" in area schools in Uganda.

Volunteer, guest teacher opportunities are available at the **toddler level**, the **3-6 level** and the **6-9 level**. (The upper grades are traditionally taught at the current time.) English is spoken as Uganda is part of the British Commonwealth. The school year in Uganda begins around February 1. Victoria School Update

The Victoria Montessori School, founded in 2001 in Entebbe, is thriving.

Serving approximately 200 children ages 2 to 12, the school has one toddler class, two 3-6 classes, one 6-9 class; the upper grades through seventh grade are traditionally taught.

This year Christine Kijange set up her 6-9 classroom in which she is doing a self-directed internship with Midwest Montessori Teacher Training Center of Evanston, IL. During the past year, the school built two new classrooms, a teacher training office, a future resource room (that will house a small library and two computers), a new kitchen and a cistern to collect rainwater for cleaning.

My husband, Tony, and I enjoyed a two-week work-visit with Christine and her husband, Joseph, in February 2008.

Aheartfelt thanks goes to Deborah (Oma) Harris, director of the Montessori Centre, Nashville, TN; their toddler teacher, Sheri Minter, who accompanied us; and to all the parents of the PTA at the school for "going the extra mile" to help the children of Uganda. They raised funds for the teacher's airfare, room and board, and for toddler materials.

Sheri offered the teachers a role model and training. She helped with the set-up of the environment and helped in the classroom with the children.

Three boxes and two suitcases of high-quality, educational, wooden materials not readily available in Uganda were sent by Nashville parents. The beauty and quality of the materials provided great joy to teachers and children alike.
